AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER & FIRST RESPONDERS

TRAINING INITIATIVE



A collaboration between the Delaware Network for Excellence in Autism (DNEA) and the Autism & Law Enforcement Education Coalition (ALEC)

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is estimated to occur in one out of every 59 births. Individuals with ASD are more likely to have 911 encounters than people in the general population. It's important that first responders are trained to understand the needs of individuals with ASD and strategies to protect and communication with this population.

For this reason, the Delaware
Network for Excellence in Autism
(DNEA) is collaborating with the
Autism & Law Enforcement Education
Coalition (ALEC) to provide
community-based trainings to first
responders in Delaware.

The goal of this initiative is to complement but not replace previous training and provide additional tools to use in assessing the risk of a situation.



AVAILABLE TRAININGS

Law Enforcement/Police Officer Training

A local store manager reports a teenage acting erratically, rocking, flapping her hands, echoing to manager's words. Is she on drugs? Is she in trouble? How can you determine if ASD is a factor?

Firefighter Training

Entering a smoke-filled building, you are told there is a person with ASD still inside, possibly hiding. Where should you look first? What kind of equipment may be needed to ensure a safe outcome?

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Training

You respond to a call and it's reported the individual has ASD. How should you proceed? What's the best way to communicate with this person?

All trainings include:

- What is Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)?
- Common behaviors & characteristics
- Suggested responses
- Avoiding unfortunate situations

Trainings help foster a deeper understanding of ASD among public safety and law enforcement personnel. Trainings are available to police officers, firefighters and emergency medical service (EMS) professionals, using curriculum and videos specific to each group.

Presenters are current first responders with direct knowledge of ASD through a family member. The audience hears from a colleague with personal knowledge and an extraordinary investment in the program.
